Innovation is to the large extent a derivative of willingness to take risks.

- It is much higher in the U.S.
- → Melting pot stimulation for un-typical solutions innovations.
- Strict selection but with privileges for those who pass.
- As a consequence far better and more fruitful way of monetizing scientific findings.







We are in the middle of a dramatic and broad technological and economic shift in which software companies are poised to take over large swathes of the economy.

- Collectively, platforms dominate the Internet and our economy.
- So the Internet we know it today is almost entirely dominated by platforms.
- → Network effects whomever got big first would always win.







Three interconnected thrusts:

- First connectivity has replaced division as the new paradigm of global organization megacities, pipelines, Internet cables ...
- Second devolution as most powerful force of our age with an important counterpart aggregation.
- Third the nature of geopolitical competition is evolving from war over territory to war over connectivity.




